# 3-Mill Street Levy on March 15 Ballot – No Increase in Taxes!

An existing 3-mill street levy is on the March 15 ballot, and it's important to vote. **There will be zero increase in taxes with this levy.** The levy will cost the owner of a \$100,000 home

\$82/year. The current street levy expires on Dec. 31, 2016. The levy on the ballot (Issue 4) will replace the expired levy and would take effect this year. Collections would begin in 2017 because property taxes are collected in arrears. Union voters have approved the levy every five years since its original passage in 1976. The levy has never exceeded the original 3 mills. The levy will generate \$244,751 annually for street improvements and repairs. It will help pay for such work as the resurfacing of Martindale Road between Montgomery Street and Draper/Jodean Lane (part of a water main replacement project) -- work on this particular project is expected to be done by Aug. 31. Note: P&G street improvements are paid for by the TIF District (not by Union tax payers). **Support your community and vote March 15.** Polls are open 6:30 a.m. - 7:30 p.m. If you have questions, please call the City at 937-836-8624.

# Water-Wise Yard and Garden Maintenance Tips

Lawn care and landscaping can be one of the biggest users of water. There are a number of ways to save on water and still maintain a beautiful yard and garden. Here are some popular ideas:

- 1. Consider using less grass and more low-maintenance perennials or groundcovers. Choose water-thrifty perennials that are native to Ohio.
- 2. Group plants into high, moderate and low water-using zones to take advantage of the natural characteristics of your yard.
- 3. Use organic or inert mulches to reduce water evaporation, erosion and weed growth while enhancing your garden aesthetics.
- 4. Mow high. Set your mower blade at 3 inches or higher. Tall grass helps prevent weed growth. You might want to do one close "shaving" with the mower in the spring (at maybe 2 inches) and then raise the blade for the rest of the year. This helps to turn weeds and leaves from the winter months into useful mulch for the newly blossoming grass.
- 5. Mow more frequently to allow the shorter cuttings to fall into the lawn where they can add to the healthy humus layer and not need collecting.
- 6. If you need to rake a bit off the lawn at some point, put it under a bush in your yard instead of sending it off to the landfill with the garbage; it'll be good for the bush.
- 7. Direct home downspouts toward the lawn or a rain barrel, not the pavement. Rainwater is free; it is not chlorinated and is usually better for plants.
- 8. Rain barrels are popular. They come with lids and screens to prevent mosquitoes, and are easy to use. They are available at most of the handyman supply stores.
- 9. You might even try "drip irrigation" to apply water directly to plant roots. Drip irrigation helps maintain healthy plants and waters mostly the plant, not surrounding weeds, as sprinklers do. Some area handyman and garden stores carry new drip irrigation products.
- 10. Water before 10 a.m. or in the late evening for less evaporation during the heat of the day.
- 11. Minimize the addition of fertilizers and pesticides. Extra fertilizer increases water consumption.
- 12. Mow up your leaves in the fall and spread them on the lawn; such organic matter improves soil texture and composition over the long term and enhances the water-holding capacity of the lawn. Put some of the leaves under your bushes.
- 13. Leaf and grass clippings contain phosphorous, which the lawn needs. Most lawn fertilizers contain no phosphorous these days. Scotts, the Ohio-based national lawn fertilizer producer, recommends getting your lawn phosphorous from grass and leaf clippings, not from fertilizer.

Following these practices will help promote clean storm water in the City of Union.

### Help for Completing your 2015 Union Municipal Income Tax Return

There are several ways to complete your 2015 Union Municipal Income Tax return and to get assistance should you need it. A reminder: On Oct. 1, 2015, the Central Collection Agency (CCA) Division of Taxation (City of Cleveland) began providing full administrative services for municipal income tax collection for the City of Union 1 percent income tax.

Mayors in the area and across the nation are taking measures to help improve monarch habitats. The City of Union in collaboration with Aullwood Audubon Center will be over-seeding some rural areas with milkweed plants to create a habitat for monarch butterflies.


We as a city are committed to helping restore habitat for the monarch so these magnificent butterflies will once again flourish across the continent.

## A Reminder For When We Have Snow Emergencies in Our Community

During snow emergencies or heavy snow, vehicles must be removed from the street for at least 24 hours to allow crews to remove snow. Heavy snow means a snowfall with an average depth of 2 inches or more; drifting conditions are also considered heavy snow. Vehicles interfering with snow removal operations may be ticketed by police.
